Key Sectors for the Bangladesh PPCR

Bangladesh PPCR focuses on the following key sectors

- agriculture and food security
- extreme climate events and climate induced disaster
- water resources
- public health, migration and social protection
- to demonstrate ways to mainstream climate change vulnerability and resilience into national policies and plans consistent with poverty reduction and sustainable development goals.







Good Practices & Lessons Learned

- The first and the foremost would the need for a clear understanding of the current state of knowledge, awareness, policies to address climate change
- The political will to implement them, given the limited institutional capacities at the national (for design and implementation planning) and the local levels for field implementation.







Good Practices & Lessons Learned

- Substantial amount of work has been completed in Bangladesh identifying needs and priorities, such as the BCCSAP and NAPA.
- Therefore, the government and the MDBs involved ADB, WB, IFC - developed the SPCR in-house to move more directly to the investment phase.
- Under the leadership of MOEF, MDBs (ADB, WB, and IFC) made great strides in coordinating development of the SPCR.
- Feedback from local level communities is critical to the development and success of various initiatives, and defining appropriate spaces for stakeholder engagement at different levels is important - getting feedback is critical to successful programs but defining the space for the feedback is important for advancing the process.







Good Practices & Lessons Learned

- There are efforts to incorporate concrete consideration for the private sector in the SPCR, building opportunities for businesses while filling gaps that the government may not focus on.
- Any progress made towards more climate resilient development in Bangladesh can be amplified if coordinated with other development projects.
- The inclusion of development partners will be important to achieving broad results but it must be based on a mutual understanding of what the PPCR aims are and where they stop.
- Capacity building is an important part of the PPCR.
