[G/S] Already at the time of approval of the latter project ["Investment Project 1" in the SPCR], some of its key results (and indicators) were related to the forestry sector, without there being a component or activities, however, explicitly designed to deliver these results. (We had commented on this at the time of project approval in May 2011.)	This is true — as it was always the intention to integrate Investment Project 2: Forest Rehabilitation as part of Grenada's SPCR into the RDVRP for the reasons outlines above. As the project concept note outlines, with the additional financing, the proposed project will take a more comprehensive approach to integrated forestry and watershed management. Once the project is integrated into the RDVRP — under the same development objective — namely, to reduce vulnerability to natural disasters and climate change, the RDVRP will be able to deliver on the

	[G/S] The project concept note mentions that the largest part of the additional financing (USD 8.2 million) would "would support reforestation activities that would reduce vulnerability to climate change through the restoration and preservation of valuable forest resource", that parts of this amount would however "also support the development of hydrological assessments, design and construction of improved drainage and flood infrastructure in urban areas and river defense works". The project concept note makes no statement about the relative proportions allocated to forest-related and construction works respectively. Since the project concept note submitted outlines a forest rehabilitation project, we would expect the major share of the budget being allocated for forest-related investments.	It is anticipated that a major sub-component of the proposed project will focus on reforestation and the rehabilitation of a forest access road required to plant and cultivate seedlings in target areas. However, the project will also include a comprehensive ridge to reef approach in close collaboration with the GIZ-supported Integrated Climate Change Adaptation Strategies" (ICCAS) Project. A comprehensive approach is required in order to ensure upper watershed reforestation activities are complemented with downstream flood mitigation measures – both to reduce vulnerability and promote aquifer generation. More details will be added in the Project Paper.

Grenada is highly vulnerable to the impacts of natural hazards - including sea level rise, storm surges and extreme weather events as well as the increasing threats to forests and water resources due to climate change impacts. In addition, Grenada has limited capacity to respond to the short and long term impacts of disaster and climate risks, and despite recent improvements in the understanding of these risks, still lacks the appropriate knowledge and awareness of the problem. In response, the RDVRP is directly aligned with the resilience goals of the Grenada SPCR and directly addresses Grenada's climate vulnerabilities. Furthermore, through leveraging additional IDA financing, PPCR resources are able maximize the scale of impact, and provide the optimal instrument that both reduces transactions costs on the government and ensures close coordination of Grenada's SPCR activities. Grenada may choose to co-finance PPCR resources with WB IDA resources (.75% interest with a 40 year maturity period), which is nearly as concessionary as PPCR loans. Currently, Grenada's entire IDA 17 envelope is allocated to budgetary support in order to address the current fiscal situation together with the IMF. In this vein, if Grenada does choose to allocate some of its IDA 17 envelope, it will be a modest amount (less than US\$4 million) and will follow the principles of the PPCR document that lays out the use of concessional finance.

	[G/S] In our comments on the SPCR (of March 2011) as well as on the "Disaster Vulnerability and Climate Risk Reduction Project" (of May 2011) we pointed towards the importance of addressing gender issues in a results-oriented manner. In the project proposal for the use of the additional financing, gender aspects should not only be discussed in the narrative, but should be explicitly addressed in the results framework and its indicators.	Mandatory PPCR indicators were only approved in January 2013 and adjusted in May 2013. Baselines for these indicators are currently being formulated. Grenada has shared its PPCR results framework with the PPCR Sub-Committee, which include indicators that measure the extent to which gender is addressed during the implementation of Grenada's SPCR. In order to improve the baseline information required to analyze gender impact, the Government of Grenada (with support from the PPCR) is undertaking a process at the country level (supported by the CIF) to align the project indicators with the PPCR core indicators, including gender indicators. These indicators will be updated semi-annually and made public by the World Bank.

The project	This is a very important point, and one that the team has implemented, to a large extent, already. In fact, the WB team met with the GIZ representative from the German Federal Ministry for the Environment, Nature Conservation, Building and Nuclear Safety (BMUB) twice during ICCAS preparation (1 time in Washington, DC and 1 time in Grenada), which was prepared quite quickly. Since then, the WB team has met twice with the newly arrived GIZ team in Grenada together with the Permanent Secretary, and has coordinated closely with the GIZ team on the development of the PPCR concept note. Dear Andrea Thanks for sending this approval request. Having been through the documentation I'm afraid we need to request some clarifications about this approval before we can proceed with endorsing it, specifically:
☐ Can the team clarify if this is a request for approval of this project, rather than just allocation of extra resources to it (for which further project documentation will follow for approval)?
☐ This proposal to allocate these additional resources along with the Forest Rehabilitation project resources to the RDVP, seems to mean that the entire SPCR is now effectively co-financing the RDVP (with the exception of a few TA studies). As the previously approved (in May 2011) DVRP project was also a contribution to the wider RDVP project. Can the team confirm if this is the case?
\Box If this is the case can the team provide a full breakdown of RDVP financing including IDA resources, previously approved PPCR resources and this new allocation and how this is being used for the RDVP overall.
☐ We would also like reassurances on the appropriate use of PPCR finance for the RDVP overall – that it is being used to supplement and not substitute for IDA resources (UK comments on original SPCR submission referred to – see attached).
□ Can the team also compile in one place the relevant project documentation for the RDVP inclusive of all these resources, with all the information on safeguards etc, as it is not currently possible to tell from this submission what exactly is being requested for approval in terms of project implementation. Not new documentation necessarily just a clear and comprehensive compilation that covers the RDVP in its entirety.

The activities a., e., g. and h. proposed for support by the additional finance under "Component 2: Regional Platforms for Hazard and Risk Evaluation..." at least partially overlap with activities planned under the ICCAS project, as follows:

- a. Identification of all potential water sources in Grenada: The ICCAS project is already in the process of mapping all non-NAWASA (National Water and Sewerage Authority) water sources jointly with communities to ensure access to clean water in case of disasters.
- e. Public education program on the importance of protecting and maintaining healthy watersheds: The ICCAS project is planning community education (particularly schools, youth) and public awareness programs etc., e.g. on water conservation and water resource use.
- g. Select two watersheds for completing state of the environment (SOE) reports ...: The ICCAS project aims to develop drought and flooding plans for two to-be-selected key watersheds.
- h. Review of water policy, recommendations and state of implementation: the ICCAS-Project provides specific support to the water sector in Grenada, with the review of the water policy according to climate change adaptation considerations being an important and integral part.
